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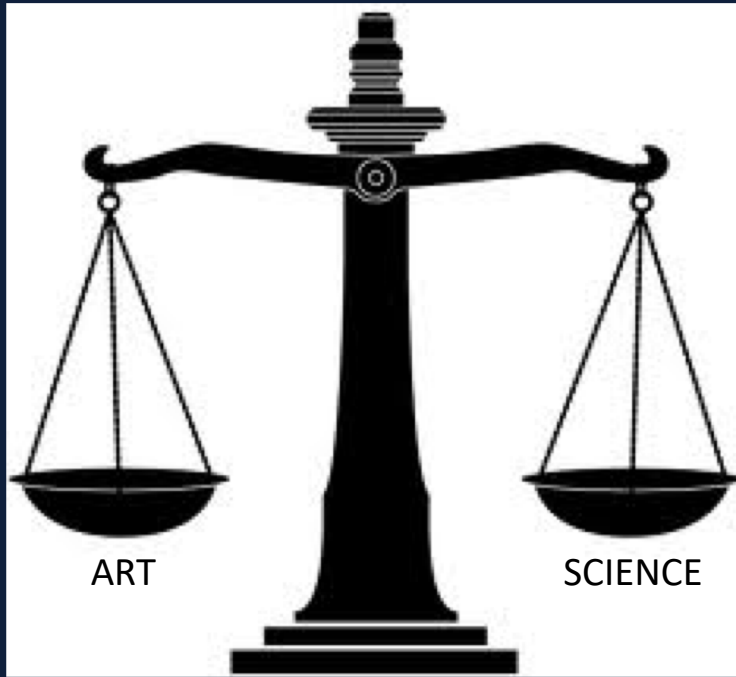

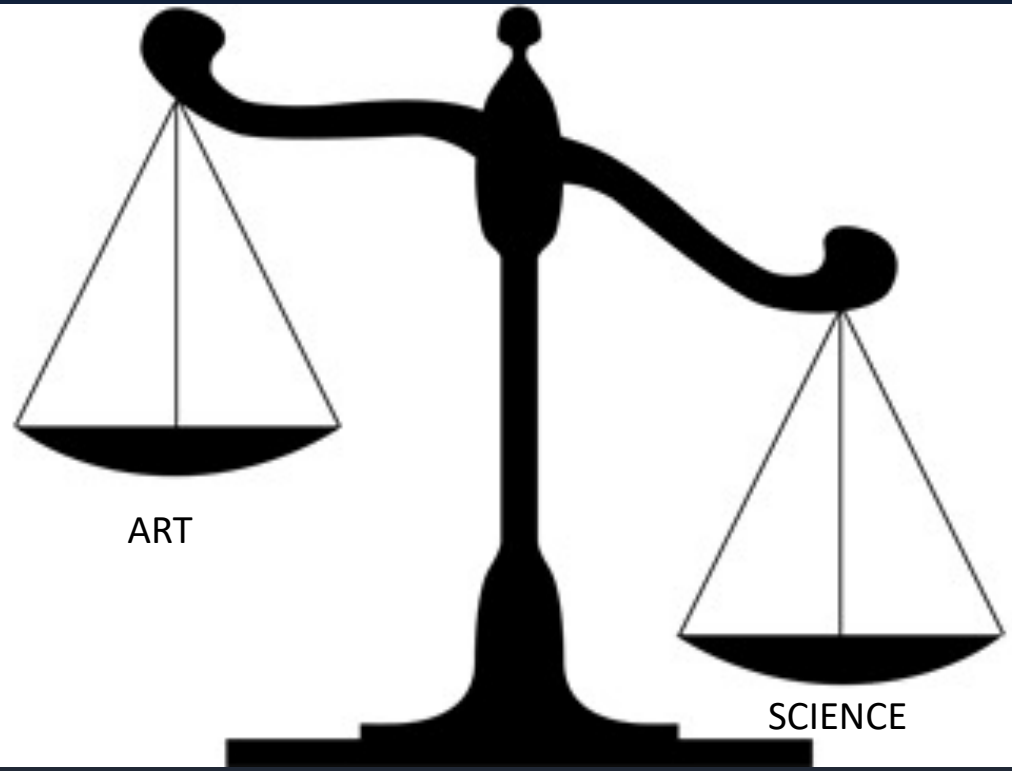

The importance of communication

The Problem

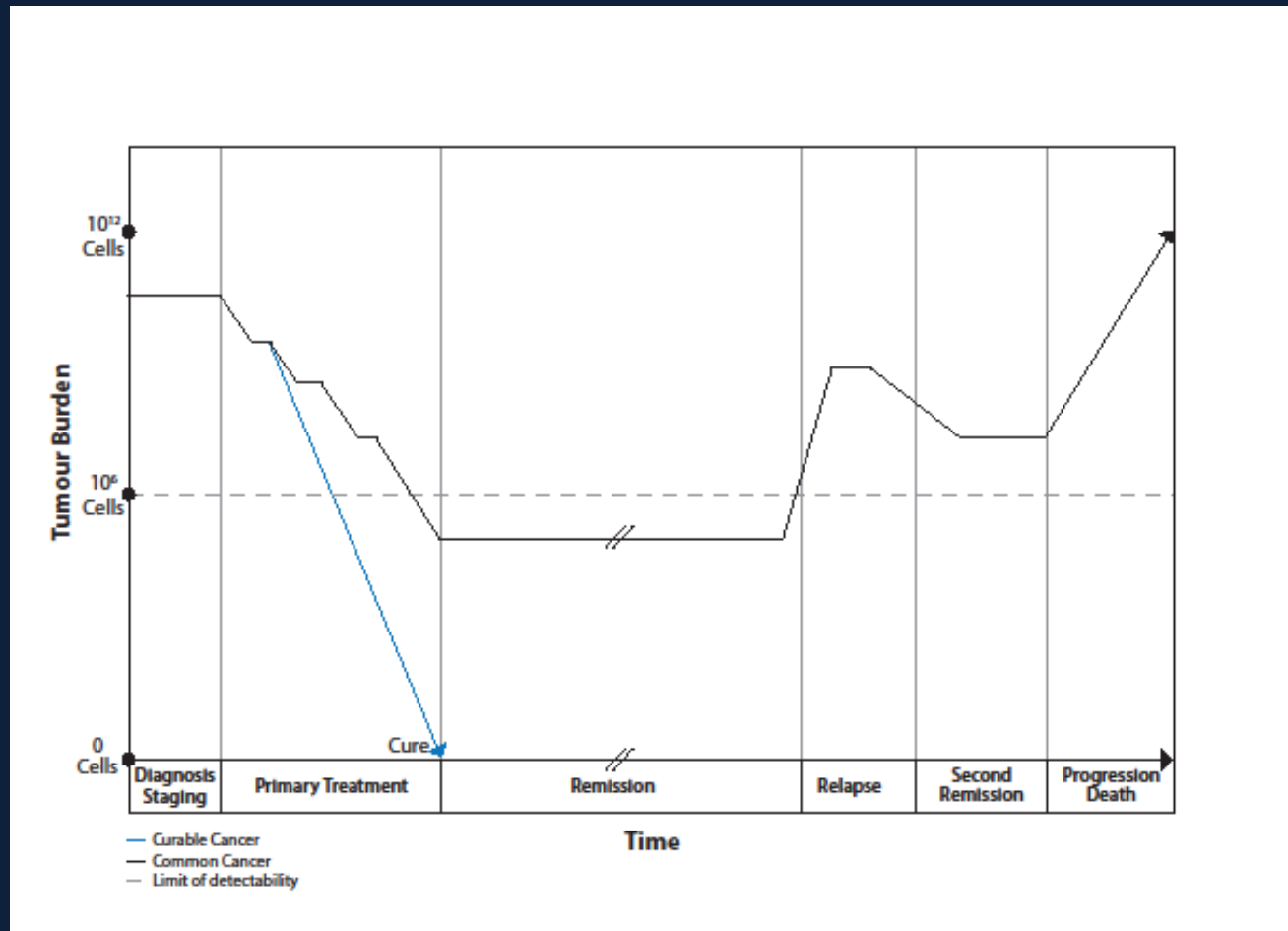
- 1. Ever increasing scientific knowledge:**

- 2. Ever increasing patients expectations and self acquired knowledge (web)**

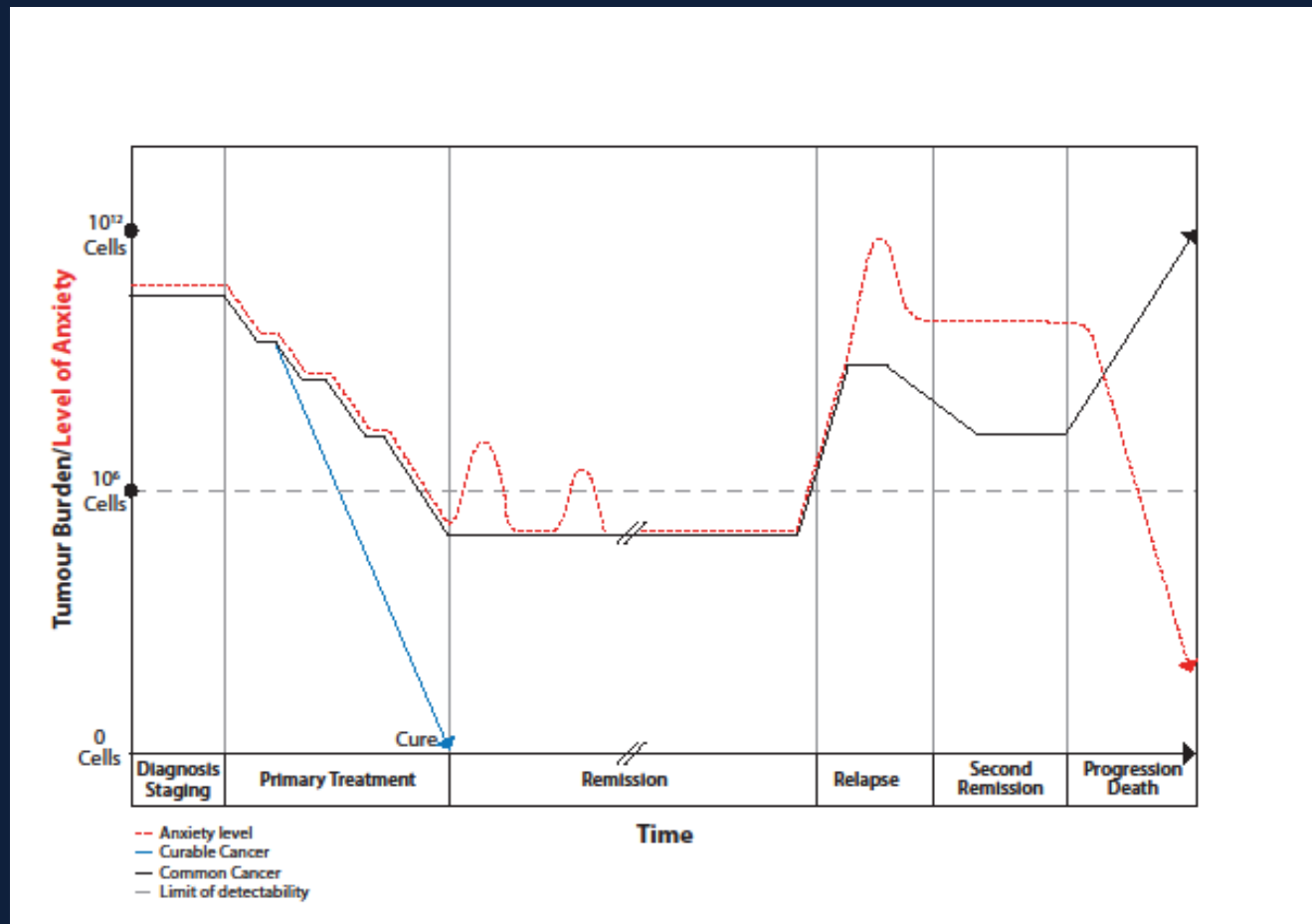
The Challenge - Communication

- So much information to explain
- Too little time to TALK and LISTEN

Tumour growth through different phases of disease management



Fluctuating levels of anxiety through different phases of disease management



Some Solutions

1. Plan consultation time
2. Share complex explanations with colleagues – especially nurses
3. Support conversations with hand-outs and appropriate websites
4. Monitor patients comprehension during and after treatment

New Patient Consultation

- Referral information
- Results of investigations to date
- History
- Examination
- Further investigations (staging)
- Possible treatments

Communication within the Context of Multidisciplinary Care

- Doctors
- Nurses
- Psychologists
- Patient Support Groups

Communicating About Follow-up

- Monitoring remission
- Survivorship issues
 - Fear of relapse
 - Exercise/diet/sex/work
 - Children and Dependents

Progression and Terminal Care

- When to introduce colleagues from palliative care

- LISTEN to and understand specific anxieties
