## HOW TO CHECK YOUR SKIN FOR SKIN CANCER

By checking your skin regularly, you'll learn what is normal for you.




The best time to check your skin is after a shower or bath.

Use a full-length mirror and a hand-held mirror in a room with plenty of light.

#### Check yourself from head to toe:

- Look at your face, neck, ears, and scalp.
   You may want to use a comb or a blow
   dryer to move your hair so that you can see
   better. You also may want to have a relative
   or friend check through your hair. It may be
   hard to check your scalp by yourself.
- 2. Look at the front and back of your body in the mirror. Then, raise your arms and look at your left and right sides.
- Bend your elbows. Look carefully at your fingernails, palms, forearms (including the undersides), and upper arms.
- Check the back, front, and sides of your legs.
   Also check the skin all over your buttocks and genital area.



### Learn where your moles are and their usual look and feel.

Check for anything new, such as...

- a new mole (that looks different from your other moles)
- a new red or darker color flaky patch that may be a little raised
- a change in the size, shape, color, or feel of a mole
- · a sore that doesn't heal
- a new flesh-colored firm bump

# ABCDE Rule To Detect Melanoma

The ABCDE rule is a common recognised screening tool used to assess characteristics of normal moles vs abnormal moles (melanoma)

#### **ASYMMETRY**

An Irregular shape -The 2 halves should be symmetrical



#### **BORDERS**

Look for unclear, irregular or ragged borders



#### **COLOUR**

Changes in colour, especially black, blue or uneven colour



#### **DIAMETER**

More than 5 - 6mm in diameter and change in size



#### **EVOLVING**

Changes in shape, size, colour, itching, bleeding of existing mole or if a new mole/ lesion appears
